

Grandfather Lodowick Ludwig Metz ⁵ was born in the year 1705⁶ near Metz', Germany⁶, to Peter Van Metz'. He was a trailblazer and courageous in his firm conviction, and restless and adventurous in his nature. When he turned eleven⁶ he migrated to Switzerland. From there, he came to Amsterdam from where he came to America on an awillary cruiser. 'I After three long weeks on the high seas, he set foot in the dreamland, late in October 1726⁶.

We know little about Lodowick between the time he was born ca 1705, the time he went to Switzerland as a child (ca 1716), and when he arrived in Philadelphia. Understanding the context helps understand why Lodowick and so many other Mennonites fled Europe in the late 1600's and early 1700's.


Without a doubt he was a Mennonite based on association and marriages. We are still working to locate his parents, siblings, etc

During the 1600s and 1700s, wars ravaged Germany. Marching armies trampled down fields of grain, stole cattle, and burned down farmsteads. In their wake, famines spread over the land. Taxes, levied to pay for the war, added to the people's plight. Religious disputes also drove people to leave their homes. In Europe the rulers chose what church they wanted in their lands. Many pious Germans of strong convictions found this hard to bear. North America, especially Pennsylvania, offered them religious freedom. <u>Many Mennonites emigrated</u> from Bern and went to **Alsace and the Palatinate**. Metz at that time was in <u>Alsace</u>.

The (Swiss) jails at this time (ca 1710) were filled with religious prisoners and

due to the famine in Alsace, many former exiles were returning to Switzerland. The disposition of these Mennonites taxed the wits of the Bern authorities. So they decided to send them to America.


"Beginning with 1726, and owing partly to renewed oppression on the part of the Palatine government, and partly to a new war scare, the Mennonites of the Palatine again became uneasy and desirous of emigration to a more secure land."****





We understand Lodowick emigrated to America in 1726 – there were no ships records kept. Circumstantial evidence abounds, but there is hope that someday our unanswered questions will remain as such no more.

- · He is said to have sailed from Amsterdam
- We understand he came to America on an auxiliary cruiser an armed merchant ship. He likely worked for his passage. No records have been located



Switzerland to Mannheim to Rotterdam was a standard migration path. For a

long time Mannheim was a center of the congregations in the <u>Palatinate</u> "from 1650 on, Mennonite families from the <u>Palatinate</u> and new ones from Switzerland moved into the depopulated city and in inconspicuous quiet formed a small congregation led by their elder; their life and civic industry was by no means a deterrent to the reviving city". However by 1706 city authorities said Mennonites now living in Mannheim should be gradually put out of the city, since they were not to be tolerated in the province. A letter of 30 March 1710 relates that 56 Swiss Mennonite prisoners had arrived at Mannheim from Switzerland on 28 March, many of whom remained there because of sickness when the rest moved on





1. Philadelphia

William Penn received his <u>charter for Pennsylvania</u> from Charles II (1630-85), the English King, in March 1681 and proposed a model society founded on principles of peace and <u>religious liberty</u>. He made specific plans to build a great city named Philadelphia, in a grid pattern with large lots on the Delaware River, to serve as the focal point for surrounding townships.

2. Manheim, PA

- At the time Lodowick emigrated, Manheim was a sparsely populated area. We understand he went there to be near relatives. But we have no records of any Metz Mennonites, anywhere. **Why not??**
- 3. Lodowick METZ in Rapho TWP
 - Was here before we became the United States of America.
 - Bought 3 pieces of land from 1734-1748 totaling over 450 acres from WILLIAM PENN...... We know exactly where all his land is, but not where his homesite was built
 - Lodowick METZ lived 51 years and was married twice. His second

wife Barbara LONG is our direct ancestor and we know they married in 1743 They had 5 living children. We know where he was buried, but the cemetery stones have been destroyed.



Lodowick Metz Land

Lodowick was here when Pennsylvania was part of British Colonial America, and subject to the King of England.

The address today is the town of Manheim, Rapha Township, Lancaster Co Pennsylvania

Land patents from 1734-1748 total over 450 acres

We know exactly where all his land is, but not where his homesite was built. We know where sons Ludwig Jr and Abraham homesites were.

We believe Christian lived on Abraham's homesite but it has not yet been proven.


Abraham METZ

- Built the grist mill in 1814 on Dillinger Run Creek at 130 Fairview Road, Manheim PA
- Was a Private in the American Revolution under Captain Hayes in the 8th Company 7th Battalion Pennsylvania Militia



Abraham's home was built over Dillinger Run Creek so they could get water during Indian raids without going outside.

This home has also been restored.



Abraham and 2nd wife Esther are buried on a knoll at the highest point on their farm, Metz Graveyard / Sporting Hill Cemetery.

The graveyard was destroyed after 1935, as the farmers needed all land for planting crops after the great depression. This was very common during the depression era.


Christian METZ and brother John METZ married sisters Barbara and Elizabeth MARTIN.

The document above was found in the attic of Christian's brother John METZ, when his family was going thru the home prior to demolition.

Christian bought his father Abraham's mill in 1821. He sold the land in 1830s, but we are not sure where he lived next.

Christian moved to Wooster, Wayne Co OH to be with daughter Martha Metz Shaeffer and family after his wife passed.

He is buried in Maize Cemetery, Wooster, Wayne Co OH



David Metz was born in Mount Joy, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania in 1826, and moved with family, as a child, to Seneca County, Ohio. There he met and married Mary Matilda Willow in 1851.

By 1880 David and his family moved to Bell Creek, Burt County, Nebraska.


David and Mary moved to Sioux City Iowa prior to 1900, David passed away November 1910, and Mary died in 1916 in Dallas, Tripp County, South Dakota. They are both buried in the Craig Cemetery, Burt County, Nebraska. Their headstones are spelled with an s – METS – due to the hatred of Germans during the World Wars.



Samuel Clinton METZ was married 4 times

- Pearl May BARKER in Dec 1890 in Tekamah NE and had 1 son Arthur Frederick METZ in 1888
- Mary A KNEELAND in 1897 in Gordon, Sheridan Co NE
 - Samuel Clinton homesteaded land in 1891 in Sioux County NE
 - They had 3 children Lottie in 1898, Nellie in 1900 and George W in January 1906
 - Feb 5 1906 1 month old son George died
 - Mar 1 1906 wife Mary and both daughters died in a blizzard on the way home from school
- Marrabell COLLONS Mar 1907 in Harrison, NE. Divorced Jan 1910
- Eva Amelia SMALLEY

He moved to Fort Morgan, Colorado with brother Granville METS. Both brothers are buried at Fort Morgan Cemetery.



Arthur Frederick METZ and Christina Elizabeth ENGEL had 12 children and 27 grandchildren. They eloped December 24, 1908 along with Christina's sister to the Wayne County Courthouse and were each other's witnesses.
